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In The Blue Water Navy

Mike,

It's Veteran's Day, and I thought I would take this opportunity to reach out to you concerning USS Reeves, and 'Agent Orange'.

I reported aboard USS Reeves DLG-24 in 1966 in Long Beach, Ca., prior to Reeves deploying to Yokosuka, Japan, for a home port change.

I was an MM3 at the time, and had just recently returned stateside from a WestPac cruise aboard another, much older 'tin can'. I was assigned to Main Control (F.E.R.) on Reeves, and remained there throughout my tour, which ended in 1968, when Reeves departed Japan to return to the USA, via Australia. Myself and Jim Vantine, another Machinist Mate, cast off the bow line from the pier that morning... We had both volunteered to stay homeported in Japan, and we were waiting for our new ships to arrive in Yokosuka.

But I digress. The reason that I am writing to you concerns 'Agent Orange' and the VA's list of authorized 'Blue Water' Navy ships.

During my tour on Reeves, we had a fairly significant fire on board, which destroyed the after missile radar electrical and electronics. I believe this occurred sometime in 1966, and if my feeble memory is correct, happened while transiting from Subic Bay, P.I. to the South China sea, on the midwatch. The fire burned long and hot before being extinguished, burning through the deck into the space below,

and burning and warping the adjacent weather deck bulkheads.

As we were still some distance from Vietnam, the CO made the decision to 'carry on' and complete our mission, as if nothing happened. A massive cleanup commenced the following morning, and the Deck department, under the direction of BM1 'Red' Coward, began the arduous task of prepping and painting the weather deck bulkheads, and by the time we made landfall, only a trained eye could detect any outward signs of fire damage.

This is what I think is so important.... Reeves pulled in and anchored in the harbor at Da Nang, **Vietnam.** We stayed at anchor for all of that day and the following day. Several boat transfers to the pier were conducted during that time. I don't know who, if anyone, has the time and dates for the events I have stated, but they did happen. What I can NOT understand, given the intense operations and significant amount of time Reeves spent in the South China sea, performing plane guard, search and rescue, and forward air controller duties, that Reeves is NOT on the VA's approved list, and should be.

Many of our shipmates from that era are now suffering from health issues that are directly related to 'Agent Orange', and are receiving absolutely nothing from the Veterans' Administration, and that is a shame, and a

Guess we have been forgotten; I was on the REEVES from 1970-71 as a RM 2 and Jim Eastwood was a signalman from 70 to 72.

We were a hand picked crew put together in Norfolk as the ship was being refitted in Bath, Maine.

Was quite exciting.

Also, I was on the USS HULL (DD 945) before being transferred to the REEVES. Got off the REEVES when I volunteered to

go to Saigon and work in communications till I was released in '72

I was assigned to the Reeves while it was refitted in Bath. I stayed on the ship till I was transferred to Saigon for duty as a RM2, in '71 and released from duty in 3/72.

Should I be concerned about Agent Orange?

Also, I was on the DD 945 from '68 to '70, and had two to three WESTPACs. One of our officers actually wrote a magazine/log explaining our assignments off

the coast of 'Nam which I still have.

I'm sure we were in the vicinity of some exposures effecting us.

Can you shine some light on any of this?

Ed. As you served on HULL during both SEADRAGON and NGFS support ops, that should give you eligibility for Agent Orange - but only if you entered Danang or some other port and actually set foot on dry land. The Blue Water Navy issue is still being heavily contested in Congress. If it ever passes, and the President signs it, those of us who sucked poisoned water through our evaps will qualify.

The fact that you were in Saigon before 1973 definitely qualifies you for Agent Orange benefits. Were I you, I would contact the VA soonest with your DD214 and establish your eligibility for a future claim.

Please let me know how it goes.

As far as getting you onto the roster, what you have done is exactly how it works. You find the website. You send me an email. I add you to the list. Now you will get the quarterly email newsletter. I have rounded up over 3600 names of shipmates from several sources. I have snail mail or email addresses for 756. So, it's a slow and tedious process.

BTW, I had Jim Eastwood's name in the database but no contact info. If you could, send me his email address. I will update the web roster.

Our older shipmates are now suffering an assortment of medical conditions associated with 'Agent Orange', and no help is forthcoming for them at this time.

I am in touch with several from the Vietnam era, my old shipmates, and all have some form of disability.

Diabetes, cancer, heart and kidney problems seem to be the most prevalent. Most of these guys are tough old birds, and it is just heart wrenching to see and hear of the issues that they are facing, and living with each and every day.

If you have any influence, any at all, I would urge you to take a moment to utilize it to help our shipmates. It's a worthwhile cause.

As for me, I'm lumped in with the rest, and have suffered some issues. What is different for me is that I served on a couple of other DD's that did make the VA's approved list, and I am receiving VA benefits. Maybe I have a guilt complex, but I feel that we all 'put it on the line' each and everyday that we served in the combat zone, and each and everyone should be entitled to the same benefits. Just my thoughts.

I hope the Reeves Association can help sway the VA to do the right thing.

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Reunion 2016: San Antonio, Texas

Back at the Portland Reunion in October 2014, our shipmates selected San Antonio as our 2016 reunion site.

In a search of all of San Antonio venues, dealing with the CVB, and a conversation with HotelPlanners for the hotels alongside the River Walk and elsewhere in San Antonio in 2015, only one was able to accommodate us at a reasonable rate in the place we'd really like to be: El Tropicano River Walk Hotel.

We received six proposals from hotels throughout the San Antonio area: airport, Western Hills, northern suburbs, etc. Many hotels declined to submit a proposal as they couldn't meet our RFP criteria. Room rate was the overriding but unstated reason for disinterest.

Only two River Walk hotels provided a proposal. An in-depth search on the Tivago website was very informative.

Before suggesting San Antonio, we didn't know just how expensive any accommodations along the River Walk would be. It was a very rude awakening. Without exception, daily room rates varied from \$150 to over \$300 per day, even in October, our preferred meeting month. And, as we found out, there is no such thing as complimentary

transportation from the airport to downtown hotels—or complimentary parking on the hotel properties.

In the proposal from El Tropicano, several problems were overcome. The largest was an acceptable daily room rate (\$115). The next was the daily complimentary breakfast. This was followed closely by no charges for the hospitality and banquet rooms, or setup and daily service fees, And lastly, the hotel agreed to participate in our Friday welcoming reception. Basically, the hotel was willing to negotiate.

Since there is so much to do on the River Walk, and the nearby Downtown and Old Town (Mercado) areas, only one day trip is planned—to the National Museum of the Pacific War (Admiral Nimitz Museum) in Fredericksburg. There will be more information in future issues of the newsletter.

San Antonio tours depart the hotel regularly and cover all sites of interest. The most complete city tours are the all-day Ultimate Trolley Tour and the Grand City Highlights Tour.

As there are no plans for a dinner cruise, evenings are free to explore the many restaurants throughout the area. As done at past reunions, there will be a

Corrected Attribution

In Spring Newsletter 8-2, when answering an email, I stated that the Wikipedia version of the ship's history was copied from the REEVES' website. It turns out I was wrong. The original history version was copied from Wikipedia to the REEVES site. Looking at the editorial history of the Wikipedia page, there was new content published in July/October 2006 by an unregistered IP address. In the spirit of proper attribution, I can only assume that the IP address belonged to Tony Bussard, especially with the break-away theme music information. All of that predates the domain registration date of the REEVES website.

The following preamble has been added to the website's ships' history

page:

This history has been compiled over time from many sources and edited to present a comprehensive narrative. The basis of this history, its original structure and format were found on Wikipedia when this website was undergoing construction, and were apparently written by shipmate JOSN Tony Bussard (85-87) in July/August 2006 (as attributed by Wikipedia to an unregistered IP address). Many additions and expansions from the original narrative as seen on this website have not been copied to Wikipedia. There are many contributors to the Wikipedia version. Both versions should be read.






Veterans Affairs

Seminole, FL – In response to letters and pressure by Congressman David Jolly (FL-13), the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) is instituting a new process to avoid wrongly declaring veterans deceased.

"This is a problem that has gone on far too long and I applaud the VA for taking steps to prevent these types of mistakes from happening in the future. As we have seen, wrongly declaring a veteran dead can create financial hardships and it is extremely disconcerting," Jolly said.

In a recent letter sent to Jolly, the VA says it erroneously stopped 7, 2014 and April 1, 2015.

The Tampa Bay region has seen at least 6 cases in the past 18 months where the VA declared a veteran dead when they were still alive.

Following two high profile Pinellas County cases and Jolly's pointed inquiries the VA says it is

instituting a new process to help verify a veteran is truly dead before halting benefits. The VA says under the new guidelines, beneficiaries like Clearwater's Mary Ann Clough, who was incorrectly declared dead last fall, will have an opportunity to correct an error before the VA terminates their monthly benefits.

Jolly had Clough's benefits restored and the VA records corrected shortly after being notified of the error.

In November, Jolly helped Michael Rieker of Dunedin after the VA mistakenly said he was dead and terminated his benefits.

After receiving national attenbenefits to 115 people between July tion for his work on this issue, Jolly was recently contacted by a Vietnam veteran from California with a similar problem. Carl Colamonico says the VA told him their records showed he was already dead and buried at Riverside National Cemetery in Riverside, CA. The VA also informed Colamonico that their records actually showed he

served during World War II and was at one point a Prisoner of War.

At Jolly's urging, the VA has conducted a review and now says Colamonico's records are accurate.

"It is extremely difficult to hear from veteran constituents not only living in Pinellas County but from across the country whose records have been erroneously altered by the VA. These are very human stories with serious consequences and I am hopeful the new protocols implemented by the VA will ensure these errors never happen again," Jolly added.

On November 4, 2015 Jolly wrote VA Secretary Robert McDonald highlighting Rieker's situation and asking what steps the VA was taking in conjunction with the Social Security Administration (SSA) to prevent future cases of veterans wrongfully being declared dead.



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Internet Speed

Consumer Reports suggests verifying that you are getting the speed you need, especially if you're paying for better performance than you're receiving. The popular movie and TV show streaming service Netflix recommends a download speed of 5 megabits per second for HDquality video. However, Consumer Reports says that is insufficient for a multiple-person household: Given how much data Americans consume, 5 Mbps isn't going to cut it since performance can suffer as your broadband speed is split among more simultaneous users and/or activities.

You can check your Internet speed on websites like Ookla's Speedtest.net (http://www.speedtest.net). Consumer Reports recommends testing it multiple times over the course of a

few days, including at varying times of day.

For streaming video, it's important to focus on the download speed. If you upload a lot of photos or videos or play games online, pay close attention to the upload speed. If your Internet isn't delivering the speed you need, Consumer Reports offers the following tips:

To help determine if an older modem or router is part of the problem, verify that your router supports the 802.11n standard "at the very least," Consumer Reports says. If not, ask your Internet service provider about getting a newer model that supports a newer standard, called AC, that is capable of faster speeds.

To determine whether your wireless connection is part of the problem, switch to a wired connection and retest your Internet speeds.

If your wireless connection is spotty, try moving your router to a more central location. Also make sure it's away from obstructions like walls or ceilings, and never keep it in a closet or cabinet.

If you suspect interference from a microwave oven or cordless phone system, for example, consider switching to a dual-band router that can operate on both the 2.4 GHz and 5 GHz frequencies. "Switching to the higher 5 GHz band can help avoid interference from other devices that operate in the 2.4 GHz range," Consumer Reports explains.

For intermittent problems, try rebooting your modem and routers by unplugging their power connections for about 30 seconds. "Sometimes simply restarting these devices will help clear up any issues," Consumer Reports says.
